## **Sports Premium Allocated Spending Review**

**Evaluated July 2023** 

2022-2023







Key Achievements 2021-2022:

- Pupils participated in a wide range of PE provision and active playtimes led by highly trained and competent staff members and coaches who oversaw sporting competitions within year groups and PE teaching across school.
- A further increase in the range of sporting competitions and physical sports on offer to children through a wide range of extra-curricular opportunities.
- Sponsorship gained for new school football kits for UKS2 and LKS2.
- A great variety of sporting clubs were offered after school by trained staff.
- The use of external experts, such as House of Dance and Cheshire Cricket Board helped to enhance the sporting offer in PE for all children.
- The school achieved gold in their Schools Game Mark 2021/22.
- Partnership in the CSSA and CSSP improved the amount of extra-curricular activities offered, to children of all abilities through differentiated events.
- All children participate daily in a mile a day initiative.
- Further revisions have been made to the school's curriculum offer in Physical Education to ensure breadth of experience with focus on the development of key skills. Curriculum intent has been reviewed and training offered to all staff.
- Introduction of knowledge organsiers and progression maps in PE.
- Teaching and support staff worked alongside expert sports coaches to develop subject knowledge and practice.
- New sports equipment was purchased for use across all year groups.
- The Jump into June initiative launched, boosting the importance of physical activity across the school.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need 2022-23:

- To maintain Schools Games Mark Gold award in 2022-23.
- Run Jump into June again, with an aim to engage a wider variety in local schools in the initiative.
- > Look to track the engagement of children in sporting opportunities more closely, to generate data on different groups and their access to these extra-curricular opportunities.
- Continue to develop the teaching in PE through high quality CPD, provided by PE leads.
- Support teachers with their planning and evidencing of PE.
- A greater focus on boosting the participation of SEND children in sporting opportunities, both in and out of school time.
- To focus on training staff to develop one of their 7 C's through the teaching of PE.
- > To conduct further work, to refine the progression map in PE, produce End Points and have more effective knowledge organisers, with Key Questions evident.
- Define and further develop means of assessment within PE, including a focus on pupilengaged assessment.
- Increase the use of technology within PE, particularly for evaluation purposes.
- To boost participation in Girls Football from Autumn to Summer by at least 30%.
- To boost PPG participation in extra-curricular sports clubs from Autumn to Summer by 30%
- For all staff to show progression within each strand of PE within their year group, making reference to curriculum overview.
- EYFS PE has clear curriculum aims and subject leaders are competent and confident in this area.
- Enter CSSA mixed gender football and netball leagues for KS2.
- > Enter a variety of aspire, celebrate and SSP choice events ran by CSSP to boost participation in interschool competitions and widen the children's sporting repertoires.
- Planning is provided to all teachers to boost their subject knowledge and delivery confidence.
- > To increase the number of SEN Support children working at ARE or above to at least 70% (only











53% at end of Summer 2 – 2021/22, compared to 90% across whole school).
To increase the number of disadvantaged pupils working above ARE to 15% (only 8% at end of Summer 2 – 2021/22, compared to 21% across whole school).
